Program Notes

"I deal with the people I know best, which are ordinary people... I write about the intellectual poor. People who are thoughtful about their condition, people who are limited in many ways, that have been cut off from having all that they want and desire, and know that this has happened to them."

—Alice Childress

"What you don't say, you swallow down." South Carolina, 1918: In the wake of World War I, amidst a raging influenza epidemic, two star-crossed lovers (Julia, a black seamstress and Herman, a white baker) seek marriage deep in the Jim Crow South, where interracial marriage is forbidden. In this "love/hate story in black and white," Herman's family and Julia's neighbors collide and no one seems to escape the influence of systemic racism. Will Julia and Herman's love for one another withstand unearthing the brutal truth? This seldom-revived play by a too-little-known female African-American playwright has never felt more relevant than right now. Alice Childress has crafted beautifully complex characters with humor, immediacy, and pathos and brings the unspoken truth to the surface, demanding conversation.

Wedding Band was written in 1963, and although the show was optioned seven times for Broadway, producers told the playwright that the play was too "ahead of its time—too sensitive and risky for the Broadway audiences of the era." Childress was unwilling to soften the play's controversial themes, and Wedding Band never received a Broadway run. The play received a production at the University of Michigan in 1966 but did not receive a full professional production until 1972, Off-Broadway at the New York Shakespeare Festival, where it was codirected by Alice Childress and Joseph Papp and starred Ruby Dee. With this production, Childress became one of the first African-American women to direct an Off-Broadway play. She is also noted as the first woman playwright to win an Obie award (Trouble in Mind, 1956).

We are thrilled to be offering *Wedding Band* in our 2018/19 season in the Department of Theatre and Dance as it has provided us with an opportunity to grapple with the difficulties of our country's past, to speak what we so often

"swallow down," to listen with empathy, to collaborate in ways that honor diverse points of view, and to offer our population of acting students, especially our students of color, opportunities to work on roles that were written for them. We are excited to offer this provocative play to the MSU community and hope that our production will encourage deeper listening and conversation surrounding the themes of the play.

Production Biographies

Heather Benton (Director) is an actor/director who specializes in integrated approaches to actor training and physical theater. She has created and/or performed original and devised work in New York City for the undergroundzero festival, East River Commedia, Theatre Trouve, Montana Repertory Theatre, Kenyon College, the American Academy of Dramatic Arts, and MSU. Directing credits include *La Chunga*, a site-specific production at the Nuyorican Café, Indigo Playground, New York; and *Emma*, *Ring Round the Moon*, *The Trojan Women*, and *Water Children* at the American Academy of Dramatic Arts in New York. At MSU she directed *Iphigenia at Aulis* by Euripides at the Alexander Kasser Theater (2016) and *Wintertime* by Chuck Mee at the L. Howard Fox Theatre (2014). Benton is a member of Actors' Equity and chair of devised theater for Region 2 of the Kennedy Center American College Theater Festival. She holds an MFA in Acting from American Repertory Theater/Moscow Art Theater at Harvard University. Benton is the program coordinator for the BFA Acting program in the Department of Theatre and Dance at MSU and an assistant professor.

Marian Palmer (Dramaturg) is a junior in the Theatre Studies program. Her aspirations include acting, writing, and producing for theater, film, and television. She has worked on sets for productions for a few years, most recently on *Anything Goes* at MSU.

Jarred Lee (Music Director) is a New York City—based musical director and vocal coach. Associate keyboard programmer credits include Broadway: *Something Rotten, American Psycho,* and *On the Twentieth Century;* Off-Broadway:

Brooklyn Night; and National Tour: Hello, Dolly! Lee is currently an accompanist for the John J. Cali School of Music at MSU.

Beatrice Capote (Choreographer) is a Cuban-American professional contemporary dancer. She trained at Alvin Ailey American Dance Center and has traveled all over the world with prestigious choreographers/companies such as Matthew Rushing; INSPIRIT, a dance company; Areytos Performance Works; and Kyle Abraham/Abraham.In.Motion. She is a member of Camille A. Brown and Dancers. She is a graduate of the University of North Carolina School of the Arts and Montclair State University with a BA in Dance Education and an MFA in Dance. She studied with masters of Danza Contemporanea de Cuba and Yesenia F. Selier. She is faculty at Alvin Ailey American Dance Center, Joffrey Ballet School, and MSU. Rick Sordelet (Intimacy Coach/Fight Choreographer) and his son, Christian Kelly-Sordelet, are the creators of Sordelet, Inc., an exciting new stage combat company bringing more than 30 years of action movement experience to the entertainment community. Sordelet has worked on 72 Broadway productions, including Disney's *The Lion King* and Disney's *Beauty and the Beast*, as well as the national tours of Disney's *Beauty and the Beast* and *Les Misérables*. His credits include 52 first-class productions worldwide. Opera credits include *Cyrano* (starring Placido Domingo) at the Metropolitan Opera, *Don Carlo* (directed by Nicholas Hytner) and *Heart of the Soldier* at San Francisco Opera, and *Cold Mountain, Don Giovanni*, Roméo et Juliette, and La Fanciulla del West at Santa Fe Opera. He has worked on films such as *The Game Plan, Dan in Real Life, Brave New Jersey,* and The Sounding. On television, he and his son worked as stunt coordinators for the hit CBS comedy series Kevin Can Wait and spent 12 years as stunt coordinators for Guiding Light. He is an instructor at the Yale School of Drama and a board member for the Shakespeare Theatre of New Jersey. Sordelet received the Edith Oliver Award for Sustained Excellence at the Lucille Lortel Awards from the League of Off-Broadway Theatres and Producers, and a Jeff Award for Best Fight Direction for *Romeo and Juliet* at Chicago Shakespeare Theater. He is the author of the play Buried Treasure and the cowriter of the upcoming feature film 20,000 Leagues *Under the Sea,* directed by Bryan Singer. www.sordeletink.com

Jacqueline Springfield (Dialect Coach) is a professional actor and a teacher of voice/speech and acting. Her teaching credits include New York Film Academy, Brooklyn College, University of North Carolina at Greensboro, Metro Theater Company, Nashville Shakespeare Festival, Shades of Black Theatre Festival, and the American College Theater Festival. She holds a master of fine arts degree in Acting from the University of North Carolina at Greensboro and is a certified associate instructor of Fitzmaurice Voicework. Springfield currently teaches voice and speech at American Musical and Dramatic Academy in New York City and she continues to work as a performer in film, television, theater, and voiceover.

Christopher Erbe (Scenic Designer) is senior at MSU majoring in Theatre Production/Design. His other credits include *Company* (Kennedy Center American College Theater Festival award winner) and *Anything Goes* (assistant). New York City credits include *Proverbs 11:29* (New York Theater Festival). Cameron Filepas (Lighting Designer) is a junior at MSU majoring in Theatre Production/Design with a concentration in lighting design. He has previously designed *Punk Rock, Company,* and *Mad Forest* as well as assisted both student and professional designers on productions including *Works-a-Foot 2015, Danceworks 2016, Iphigenia at Aulis,* and *Michigan Murders* at MSU. Other credits include assistant master electrician on *Carrie: The Musical* and master electrician on *Anything Goes.* Filepas currently is the resident lighting designer for Hopewell Valley Children's Theatre and has previously designed at the Strawberry One-Act Festival in the Theatre at St. Clement's and worked at the Ohio Light Opera as

the assistant lighting designer this past summer. Upcoming designs include *Guys and Dolls* in the Alexander Kasser Theater.

Nathanael Brown (Sound Designer) is a junior at MSU and has worked on a multitude of plays and musicals in and outside the university. Credits include the fall 2017/spring 2018 dance shows as the sound designer, the Plays in the Parks 2017 and 2018 seasons as the audio engineer, and a plethora of other shows. He is currently designing *A House on Haunted Hill* at the Metuchen Forum Theatre.

Jasmin Smith (Hair/Makeup Designer) is a senior at Montclair State studying in the BFA program for costume, hair, and makeup design.
